

# Autograph Card David Cassidy

David is very romantic. His album "Romance," with songs like "Heart of Emotion," "Tenderly, Remember Me," and especially "The Last Kiss," speaks for itself: in it, he describes all the ups and downs of a person in love. With lyrics like these, David Cassidy sings from the heart about everything that has moved him since his youth.

Even today, he can still immerse himself completely in such emotions, both at the piano and at the microphone. He admits that in the past, he was head over heels in love more than once. In such situations, the world around him usually disappeared. He saw and heard nothing else, but lived only for the moment when he could hold his girlfriend's hand again, embrace her, and love her.

"I really liked all the girls in my life," he says in an interview with BRAVO magazine. However, he remains steadfastly chivalrous and doesn't name names. He is even reluctant to talk about his wives Kay Lenz and Meryl: they are part of his very private sphere.

At the microphone, however, David is particularly good at bringing his lyrics to life, both physically and emotionally. Every song he performs leaves a piece of himself behind. Of a great love, of a great longing. His facial expressions betray it, his movements are soft and caressing, as if he were holding a girl in his arms.

The girls felt it back then, in his first round as a teen star, and they still feel it today: here is someone who really understands them, who deals with their problems. Someone who can be tender and empathetic: the ideal lover.

David says of himself that he used to be very unstable and fell in love easily. A girl only had to have the right charisma and personality and he was smitten.

"Girls will be your downfall," a friend from Los Angeles warned him at the time. But David ignored the warning and has no regrets: "My relationships were always genuine and deeply felt. They didn't hurt me—on the contrary: the only experiences I really had in isolation, without the fanfare and security guards around me, were with girls. They made me who I am today."

His marriage to Meryl is now completely problem-free and happy. Precisely because she is not in show business, the two get along brilliantly. Away from the limelight, they have the same interests and are on the same wavelength. "I wrote the song 'Romance' just for Meryl.

In the past, it never mattered to David whether a girl was tall, short, blonde, brunette, black, or red-haired: she just had to have that certain something. "I like modern, self-confident girls who know exactly what they want and don't hide their feelings," he says. He describes the spark that immediately ignites in him in such cases in the song "Touched by Lightning."

He really is struck by lightning when he falls in love. He still remembers his first love, a blonde girl, the daughter of a well-known Hollywood agent who was a frequent guest at the Cassidys' home.

I was standing in the kitchen eating my breakfast when she walked in: she was blonde, long-haired, and beautiful. I was 13, she was 16. I literally choked on my food. From that moment on, I couldn't think of anything else; I was smitten." However, it wasn't until years later, when he was almost twenty, that the spark between David and his first love really ignited.

David has no complexes whatsoever about his small stature and boyish appearance: "My measurements are exactly what I want them to be, and I'm a romantic through and through."

David claims he can read every wish in the eyes of the girl of his dreams. Back in his teens, he used to take his girlfriends to the drive-in cinema to make out. Or they would find a secluded beach: "In California, all young love happens around cars."
