Record buyers, he points out, no longer go for syndicated music shows where artists lip-sync their records in return for a plug by the TV disc jockey. preparing to record the first Patridge Family single...and he thinks it's a hit. "Of course there's no sure-fire way to call these things," says Larry, whose track record in picking winners earned him a Screen Gems, "but I've put a lot of time and effort into this one. And, in all modesty, we do not intent to leave it completely to chance. There's too much at stake."

The leads on the ABC series

are David Cassidy, son of Jack Cassidy, and David's real life stepmother, Shirley Jones. Young Cassidy, according to Uttal, has all the talent needed to be a top star, and he will do his own singing on the show. Miss Jones, as all true Rodgers and Hammerstein fans know, is a pretty good singer in her own right. David and Shirley will be featured on "Patr-idge Family", records backed up by a studio group of singer. "The music will be used on the telecast but we're not hiding anything. Only David Shirley will do their own singing. The rest of the cast was selected for acting ability only," says Uttal. Once the single is ready for

release, Shirley and David will embark on a multi-city tour on behalf of the record and the series. A two-week break in production on the series has been planned to expedite the promotion and the bubbly will flow for disc jockeys in any city where the two stars appear. "I throw a pretty good party," confessed Uttal. "But all we are really after is exposure. Let' the DJs hear the song, meet the people and—if they like it—give it a spin. We think the music will do the rest."

If the plan succeeds a breathless record-buying public will love the song, buy the record and make the series a landslide hit. On paper, it looks great but so did "The Music

Scene". Only time will tell.
