Linda pays tribute to US teen heart-throb

A David Cassidy fan who rubbed shoulders with the former teen heart-throb at East Kilbride's Olympia Ballroom in the seventies has expressed her sadness at his recent death.

Ex-pat Linda Thomson was just 14 years old when the US superstar made a pit stop in the town ahead of his concert at Rutherglen's Shawfield Stadium in 1974.

The Daydreamer singer and star

of hit TV show The Partridge Family
- who in his heyday had a bigger
fanclub than Elvis Presley and The
Beatles - lost his battle with drink and dementia last week, aged 67. Former Hunter High School

pupil Linda told the News how she blagged an interview with the star while editing the school

newspaper.
The Village gran, who moved to Cape Town, South Africa, in 1981, said: "David Cassidy came to Glasgow for a concert. At that time he was bigger than Elvis and The Beatles and the hottest man on

the planet.
"East Kilbride Town Council was running a spring clean campaign for the town and

they asked if David Cassidy would do the official opening at the Olympia

Ballroom and he agreed.
"Every schoolgirl in town wanted
to see him and all the schools banned
anyone from taking time off – this wasn't successful as everyone dogged school to go and see him!

"At the time my pal Linda Smith and I were the editors of the school newspaper 'Hunter News' so we took a chance and wrote to the fanclub asking if we could interview him for the school

magazine.
"Next we knew we were picked up and taken into The Albany Hotel in Glasgow for the official press conference along with all

the big newspapers.
"We had one of those wee tape recorders with us and when it was finished the publicist got us back into a car so we could follow David's car back to

East Kilbride.
"We ended up on the balcony of The Olympia with David Cassidy waving down at all our schoolmates. I touched his left shoulder and managed to

get an autograph. I remember him being really short and wearing an embroidered jacket - very showbiz - and lots of make-up. He was very pleasant to all of us and it was an experience I still remember 43 years

When Cassidy came to Scotland in May 1974 there wasn't an indoor venue big enough to hold his thousands of screaming fans so the gig had to be staged outdoors at Shawfield. He was welcomed to East Kilbride by

former provost, the late Jimmy Smith, pictured, with his wife Frances and

pictured, with his wife Frances and their children Brian and David. Speaking years later, David said: "I can remember flying into Glasgow in 1974, I had my own plane back then-and doing an interview with the BBC before going on to do the concert at Shawfield.

"There were thousands of girls at the airport but as we left the BBC to go to the stadium I was amazed to see girls lined up all along the streets, waving at me from both sides of the road."

Well-travelled financial advisor Linda, 57, added: "It was sad to hear that he died. Everyone watched The Partridge Family and knew all the songs and for my age group he was our first real heart-throb.
